After 1966, Argentina vs Spain clash in World Cup

New Jersey, July 16: The stage is set for a dream FIFA World Cup 2026 final as European champions Spain take on defending world champions Argentina in the tournament's 104th and final match. With both nations arriving in top form, fans can expect a thrilling battle between two of international football's biggest powerhouses.

Interestingly, the two sides have met only once before in FIFA World Cup history. Their lone encounter came in the group stage of the 1966 World Cup at Villa Park in England, where Argentina emerged 2-1 winners. Luis Artime scored both goals for Argentina, while Spain's lone reply came through midfielder Pirri, with all three goals arriving after the break.

Spain booked their place in the title clash with an impressive victory over tournament favourites France in the semi-finals. Luis de la Fuente's men dominated proceedings from start to finish, controlling possession, neutralising France's dangerous attack and

finishing their chances with clinical precision. Their disciplined, possession-based football has made them one of the standout teams of the tournament.

Argentina, meanwhile, have lived up to their reputation as reigning world champions, producing another consistent campaign to earn a place in the final. The Albiceleste will be aiming to retain the World Cup and further cement their status as one of football's greatest national teams.

Although their competitive meetings have been rare, Spain and Argentina have faced each other 13 times in international friendlies. Spain hold a slight edge with six victories, while Argentina have won five matches, with two ending in draws. Their most recent meeting came in Madrid in 2018, when



Spain produced a stunning 6-1 victory. The continental champions had been scheduled to meet in the Finalissima earlier this year in Qatar, but the fixture was cancelled, making Sunday's World Cup final the first competitive meeting between the football giants in six decades and a fitting finale to FIFA World Cup 2026.

Disturbing trend of mob violence Can sport be associated with hooliganism?

Football is celebrated as a game that unites people across nations, cultures and generations. Yet, the violent disturbances witnessed across several French cities following France's 2-0 FIFA World Cup semifinal defeat to Spain have once again raised an uncomfortable question: Can sport become a trigger for violence or holliganism?

Soon after the final whistle, groups of supporters clashed with police in Paris and several other cities. Vehicles were damaged, public property vandalised and fireworks were reportedly directed at law enforcement personnel. French authorities detained scores of people, stating that many arrests were linked to attacks on emergency services.

At first glance, the unrest may appear to be a spontaneous reaction to France's defeat. However, the picture is more complex. Spain is hardly an "inferior" opponent. The Spanish side has been one of world football's dominant forces in recent years, extending its remarkable unbeaten run while once again eliminating France from a major tournament after previous victories in Euro 2024 and the UEFA Nations League. Losing to such a formidable team alone cannot explain the scale of the violence.

The incidents instead reflect deeper social tensions that occasionally surface during major public gatherings. France has

experienced similar unrest after victories as well. When Paris Saint-Germain won the UEFA Champions League earlier this year, celebrations in dozens of cities also descended into vandalism, arson and looting. This suggests that football often becomes the occasion rather than the cause.

Authorities have pointed to organised disruptive groups that exploit large sporting events. Analysts have also linked recurring unrest to broader socio-economic challenges, including youth alienation, unemployment and growing frustration in sections of society. Added to these are the pressures of an exceptionally intense summer marked by heatwaves, drought and wildfires, all of which have contributed to public anxiety.

The irony is difficult to ignore. France is one of the world's great sporting nations. Paris has hosted the Olympic Games, stages the French Open at Roland Garros, hosts prestigious football competitions and remains one of Europe's foremost sporting capitals. It is a country with a rich cultural heritage that has long championed ideals of liberty, fraternity and civic life.

Precisely because of that legacy, scenes of violence after sporting events are deeply disappointing. Passion is an inseparable part of sport, but violence undermines the very values that sport seeks to promote, respect, fair play and unity. France is not alone in witnessing emotional reactions to sporting defeats. India too has experienced

similar episodes, particularly after major cricket losses. Chennai, along with several other cities across the country, has witnessed isolated incidents where angry supporters have resorted to arson, stone-pelting at moving buses, damaging streetlights, vandalising public property and attacking vehicles after heartbreaking defeats. Such incidents have followed high-profile international cricket matches, especially World Cup exits.

Yet, one fundamental question remains unanswered: Will burning a bus, breaking a traffic signal or throwing stones at public property ever change the result of a match? The answer is of course a big no.

Victories should not become excuses for destruction, and defeats should not become reasons for public disorder. Fans have every right to celebrate or express disappointment, but that expression must remain peaceful.

France's defeat also marked the end of an era, with Didier Deschamps concluding one of the most successful coaching tenures in French football history. He leaves behind a remarkable legacy, including the 2018 FIFA World Cup triumph and multiple appearances in major finals. His contribution deserves to be remembered for sporting excellence, not overshadowed by scenes of unrest on the streets.

The events in France serve as a reminder that safeguarding the spirit of sport is a responsibility shared by supporters, authorities and society alike.

CM Vijay orders water release

Chennai, July 16: Chief Minister C. Joseph Vijay has ordered the release of water from the Krishnagiri Reservoir, Barur Periya Eri (Barur Lake) and Kodumudiyar Reservoir to provide irrigation for more than 17,190 acres of farmland in Krishnagiri and Tirunelveli districts during the 2026-27 first crop and Kharif cultivation seasons.

The Tamil Nadu government has directed the release of water from the Krishnagiri Reservoir through its right and left bank canals from July 16 to November 12 for 120 days, subject to storage and inflows. A maximum of 1,563 million cubic feet (mcf) of water

will be released, benefiting 9,012 acres in Krishnagiri taluk.

The government has also ordered the release of water from Barur Periya Eri in Krishnagiri district through its east and west main canals from July 16 to November 22 for 130 days to irrigate 2,397 acres in Pochampalli taluk. During the first five days, water will be supplied for raising paddy nurseries, after which irrigation will follow a rotational schedule with the sluices kept open for three days and closed for four days. A maximum of 361 mcf of water will be released during the irrigation period.

In Tirunelveli district, water will be released from the Kodumudiyar

Reservoir from July 16 to October 31 for 108 days to support Kharif cultivation. The release will initially be limited to 50 cusecs through the Valliyooran Kal, Patalaiyar Kal and Aathukal canals, irrigating 2,548.94 acres. If additional inflows are received, water will also be released through the Vadamalaiyan Kal canal at up to 100 cusecs, extending irrigation to another 3,231.97 acres.

In all, the three water release orders are expected to provide irrigation to 17,189.91 acres of farmland across Krishnagiri, Pochampalli, Nanguneri and Radhapuram taluks, providing timely water supply for the ongoing cultivation season and benefiting thousands of farmers.

Tamil Nadu extends Chief Secretary Sai Kumar's tenure, announces major IAS reshuffle

Chennai, July 16: The Tamil Nadu government on Wednesday extended the tenure of Chief Secretary M Sai Kumar by six months, allowing him to continue in the top post until February 28, 2027, while announcing a major reshuffle of senior IAS officers across key departments.

Among the prominent changes, Supriya Sahu, a deputy chief secretary-rank officer who has served extensively in the Environment, Climate Change and Forests Department, has been appointed to the Entrepreneurship Development and Innovation Institute. She replaces Dheeraj Kumar, who has been transferred to the Higher Education Department. Kakarla Usha

will take charge of the Environment, Climate Change and Forests Department. Senior IAS officer J Radhakrishnan, who served as Chairman and Managing Director of the Tamil Nadu Electricity Board (TNEB), has been appointed as Director of the Anna Administrative Staff College and Director General of Training. V Arun Roy has been posted as the new Chairman and Managing Director of TNEB.

In another key transfer, Pradeep Yadav has been shifted from the Information Technology and Digital Services Department to the Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) Department, replacing Atul Anand, who will head the Information Technology and Digital

Services Department.

The government also transferred P Umanath, who was serving as Chairman and Managing Director of the Tamil Nadu Civil Supplies Corporation, as Industries Commissioner and Director of Industries and Commerce. He replaces

Nirmal Raj, who has been moved to the Transport Department. The reshuffle is part of a broader administrative exercise aimed at strengthening governance across major departments while ensuring continuity in the state's top bureaucratic leadership.
