FSSAI puts influencers celebrities on notice over food promotions



New Delhi, Agency: From "boosts immunity" to "rich in nutrients", food claims endorsed by celebrities and social media influencers are now under the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India's (FSSAI) scanner. In a significant move aimed at curbing misleading promotions, the regulator has warned influencers and celebrities that endorsing unverified food claims could invite legal action, even as it cracked down on manufacturers selling unsafe food products.

The advisory comes at a time when food brands are increasingly relying on digital creators and celebrities to market health drinks, protein supplements, snacks and packaged foods to millions of consumers online. FSSAI has asked influencers to verify that every claim made by a brand is truthful, scientifically substantiated and compliant with food safety regulations before lending their name or credibility.

The regulator said endorsements are more than advertisements because consumers often trust the people promoting them. It cautioned influencers against amplifying claims such as "boosts immunity" or "rich in nutrients" unless they are backed by evidence and permitted under food laws. Misleading food advertisements and endorsements, it said, can attract action under the Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006, and the Food Safety and Standards (Advertising and Claims) Regulations, 2018.

Govt asks Air India to take responsibility tells DGCA to improve dope checks

New Delhi, Agency: Govt has warned Air India to improve its oversight on operations and "take responsibility" for ensuring safety. The aviation ministry has also ordered DGCA to quickly revise its drug-testing rules and increase the percentage of personnel who must undergo mandatory testing. The govt has also directed the aviation regulator to enforce tougher penalties against those testing positive for "real" drugs, while giving additional chances to those whose positive results stem from medicines.

The pilot-in-command of Air India's badly rattled Aug 4 Phuket-Delhi flight with 145 people onboard is learnt to have told investigators he had been prescribed sleeping pills due to personal problems which, he claims, led to the positive dope tests. His onboard behaviour is also under the scanner after the cabin crew complained against him.

The final report of AI's last June Ahmedabad crash in which 260 people lost their lives is not yet out and then something like this happens with Air India.

Govt notifies Rs 3,030-crore scheme for three mega chemical parks

New Delhi, Agency: The Centre has formally notified the BHAVYA Rasayan scheme to establish three greenfield chemical parks across the country, paving the way for states to compete for projects aimed at boosting domestic chemical manufacturing, reducing import dependence and attracting investment.

The Gazette notification issued by the Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilisers operationalises the scheme

approved by the Union Cabinet last month. With a total outlay of Rs 3,030 crore, the scheme will run from 2026-27 to 2030-31 and support the creation of shared industrial infrastructure for the chemical sector.

Under the scheme, the Centre will provide up to Rs 1,000 crore for each chemical park, subject to the concerned state contributing at least Rs 500 crore. Any expenditure beyond this will have to be borne by the state gov-



ernment. Each park must have a minimum 8 sq km (2,000 acres) of contiguous, encumbrance-free land. The parks will be selected through a challenge-based competitive

process, with proposals evaluated on predefined quantitative and qualitative parameters, including strategic relevance, financial viability, implementation plans and

long-term sustainability.

According to the notification, the parks will provide common facilities such as central effluent treatment plants, hazardous waste management systems, water supply, solvent recovery and distillation units, steam generation and distribution networks, intercon-

nect pipelines, logistics infrastructure, laboratory testing centres and emergency response facilities, enabling industries to

reduce costs and improve environmental compliance. The government said the scheme is aimed at strengthening the entire chemical value chain, enhancing domestic production capacity, improving cost competitiveness, promoting exports and import substitution, attracting domestic and foreign investment, and generating employment, while contributing to the goal of Viksit Bharat 2047.

Al-Qaida offshoot AQIS behind Red Fort blast in 2025: UNSC report confirms

New Delhi, Agency: The United Nations Security Council (UNSC) has officially attributed the November 2025 blast near Delhi's iconic Red Fort to Al-Qaida in the Indian Subcontinent (AQIS), according to the 38th report of its Analytical Support and Sanctions Monitoring Team.

The attack on November 10 last year claimed 11 lives. Al-Qaida in the Indian Subcontinent (AQIS, not listed) continued to evolve from a fragmented group into



a regional terrorist entity; it established logistics and financial networks, working in decentralised, small, scattered cells instead of large units. The attack in November 2025 on the Red Fort in Delhi was officially attributed to AQIS," the report, published on August 10, stated.

The assessment marks a significant shift in the attribution of the Red Fort attack, which had earlier been linked to the Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM). The report noted that one member state had attributed a series of attacks to JeM and also linked the group to the Red Fort blast.

Wasim Akram, wanted in the Irfan murder case, arrested after a police encounter. 118 criminal cases

New Delhi: Wasim Akram, alias Wasim Lambu, accused in a murder case registered at the Jahangirpuri police station, attempted to escape from Delhi Police custody. After getting out of a police vehicle on the Yamuna Expressway in Mathura on the pretext of going to the bathroom, he snatched a Delhi Police constable's service pistol and opened fire on the police team. Sub-Inspector Ajay Kumar was shot in the arm. In retaliatory action, Wasim was shot in the leg and apprehended on the spot. The service pistol snatched from the constable was also recovered from his posses-



sion. Accused arrested from Bengal

According to information, a team of the North West District Special Staff, led by DCP Akanksha Yadav and Inspector Somil Sharma, arrested Wasim

Akram from Nandigram, West Bengal, on August 10. He was an accused in a murder case registered at the Jahangirpuri police station. After his arrest, the police team was returning him from West Bengal to Delhi on transit remand. He tried to escape on the way. According to a police officer, Wasim, who was injured in the encounter, received first aid. Both injured are admitted to Mathura District Hospital. At around 12:15 a.m. on Tuesday night, the team reached between milestones 63-64 of the Yamuna Expressway in the Nauhheel police station area of Mathura. Wasim asked to go to the bathroom. Policemen took him to the roadside. Then, he snatched a constable's service pistol and opened fire on the police.

Rajya Sabha row over 'lungi-wala' comment against MP

New Delhi, Agency: CPM MP John Brittas has moved a privilege motion against BJP MP Sushmita Dev, alleging that she addressed him as "lungi-wala" during proceedings in Rajya Sabha Monday. Dev denied that she had cast aspersions on attire of any state. Brittas raised the issue in the House Wednesday after listed papers were laid on the table at the start of the day. He said a member targeted him with the "lungi-wala" remark while he was moving a statutory resolution against the Income Tax (Amendment) Ordinance, 2026, Monday.

Brittas said the MP came from the treasury benches, stood behind him, disturbed him and started calling him a "lungi wala".

"I'm a proud Indian, South Indian and a proud Malayali. I cherish every moment being a Malayali - our language, culture, cuisine, and of course, our attire," Brittas said.

Making an observation on the issue, Rajya Sabha Chairperson C P Radhakrishnan said he would call the MPs concerned to his chamber to discuss the matter. He also urged MPs to be careful not to hurt the sentiments and feelings of fellow members.

Use medical tourists' money to treat poor Indians: Panel



New Delhi, Agency: Revenue earned from foreign patients and affluent Indians should help fund treatment for poorer patients, a Parliamentary Standing Committee on Health and Family Welfare has recommended, proposing that corporate hospitals adopt a cross-subsidisation model to make advanced healthcare more affordable.

The panel said hospitals that benefit from government concessions such as subsidised land, tax incentives and 100% foreign direct investment (FDI) should earmark part of the revenue generated from medical tourism and high-paying patients to provide advanced tertiary care to economically weaker Indians.

The recommendation is part of the committee's report on the affordability and accessibility of healthcare, which noted that India's corporate hospital sector has recorded strong growth driven by high-value procedures, rising medical tourism and increasing revenue per occupied bed. While acknowledging India's emergence as a global healthcare destination, the panel said the benefits of this growth must also reach patients who cannot afford expensive treatment.

Observing that private health insurance penetration in India remains low and out-of-pocket expenditure continues to push many families into financial distress, the committee said a structured cross-subsidy mecha-

nism could improve access to life-saving tertiary care for poorer patients. It said hospitals receiving government support should share part of the gains from medical tourism and premium-paying patients with economically weaker sections.

The panel also recommended that corporate hospitals reserve a defined quota of beds under government-funded health.

insurance schemes such as Ayushman Bharat PM-JAY at standard package rates, to ensure that beneficiaries have access to advanced treatment at leading private hospitals.

To address the uneven distribution of healthcare infrastructure, the committee proposed linking government incentives, including subsidised land, tax benefits and FDI facilitation, to investment in tier-2, tier-3 and rural areas.
